- **This is How You Lose the Time War** • Amal El-Mohtar y Max Gladstone (16 de julio, Saga Press) Se puede resumir esta novela corta como “una historia de amor entre enemigos en tiempos de guerra”, excepto que en este caso la guerra es entre dos facciones de viajeros en el tiempo cada una tratando de imponer su propia versión de la historia.



Among the ashes of a dying world, an agent of the Commandant finds a letter. It reads: Burn before reading.

Thus begins an unlikely correspondence between two rival agents hellbent on securing the best possible future for their warring factions. Now, what began as a taunt, a battlefield boast, grows into something more. Something epic. Something romantic. Something that could change the past and the future.

Except the discovery of their bond would mean death for each of them. There's still a war going on, after all. And someone has to win that war. That's how war works. Right?

- **To Be Taught, If Fortunate** • Becky Chambers (8 de agosto, Hodder & Stoughton) Novela corta independiente sin relación con el universo de *Wayfarers* en el que transcurren las primeras novelas de la autora. La historia trata sobre un futuro donde los terrícolas exploran y colonizan planetas extrasolares, pero con la particularidad de que son los humanos los que deben adaptarse a las condiciones de los planetas que encuentran, en vez de terraformar éstos.

Imagine a future in which, instead of terraforming planets to sustain human life, explorers of the solar system instead transform themselves. Adriane is one such explorer. As an astronaut on an extrasolar research vessel, she and her fellow crewmates sleep between worlds, and wake up each time with different features. Her experience is one of fluid body and stable mind, and of a unique perspective on the passage of time. Back on Earth, society changes dramatically from decade to decade, as it always does. Ariadne may awaken to find that support for space exploration back home has waned, or that her country of birth no longer exists, or that a cult has arisen around their cosmic findings, only to dissolve once more by the next waking. But the moods of Earth have little bearing on their mission: to explore, to study, and to send their learnings home.




- **Meet Me in the Future: Stories** • Kameron Hurley (20 de agosto, Tachyon) Colección de 16 relatos de Hurley escritos durante la última década, y que reflejan a la perfección el particular estilo de esta autora.

When renegade author Kameron Hurley (*The Light Brigade; The Stars Are Legion*) takes you to the future—be prepared for the unexpected. Yes, it will be dangerous, frequently brutal, and often devastating. But it's also savagely funny, deliriously strange, and absolutely brimming with adventure.

In these edgy, unexpected tales, a body-hopping mercenary avenges his pet elephant, and an orphan falls in love with a sentient starship. Fighters ally to power a reality-bending engine, and a swamp-dwelling introvert tries to save the world—from her plague-casting former wife. So come meet Kameron Hurley in the future. The version she's created here is weirder—and far more hopeful—than you could ever imagine.




- **The Future of Another Timeline** • Annalee Newitz (24 de septiembre, Tor Books) Al principio el argumento de esta novela me parecía muy trillado (“otra historia de viajeros en el tiempo tratando de evitar que suceda un terrible futuro”). Pero luego leí esta premisa, y mi opinión cambió totalmente: *“En esta novela, viajar en el tiempo es fácil, pero cambiar la historia es casi imposible. No es tan simple como volver atrás y detener a una figura influyente, por ejemplo: hay que cambiar el entorno que permitió que esa persona llegara al poder en primer lugar”*. 
In a modern-day United States that's just a step away from our own, time travel is possible. But a secret war is brewing over access to history.




- **Supernova Era** • Cixin Liu (22 de octubre, Tor Books) La CF china ha venido para quedarse, como demuestra la publicación de esta nueva novela independiente del afamado autor de la trilogía de los Tres Cuerpos. ¿Sabrá estar a la altura de las expectativas? Por de pronto, ya podemos disfrutar de un pequeño excerpt de prueba.

Eight light years away, a star has died, creating a supernova event that showers Earth in deadly levels of radiation. Within a year, everyone over the age of thirteen will die.

And so the countdown begins. Parents apprentice their children and try to pass on the knowledge they'll need to keep the world running.

But the last generation may not want to carry the legacy of their parents' world. And though they imagine a better, brighter world, they may bring about a future so dark humanity won't survive.



- **Interference** • Sue Burke (22 de octubre, Tor Books) Esta novela es la continuación de **Semiosis**, una de las obras de 2018 de las que más se hablado, aunque sorprendentemente se ha quedado en blanco en el capítulo de nominación a premios. Hay una entrevista con la autora, aunque me temo que no deberías leerla si no queréis destripes de la primera entrega.

También se han anunciado algunos títulos para 2020 y 2021, aunque he de avisar que en estos casos las fechas son tentativas y los libros podrían sufrir retrasos:

- Ya tenemos título y fecha de salida de la nueva novela de Martha Wells de la serie de *The Murderbot Diaries* (compuesta hasta el momento por las novelas cortas **All Systems Red**, **Artificial Condition**, **Rogue Protocol** y **Exit Strategy**). Se titulará **Network Effect** y se anuncia para mayo de 2020. ([Anuncio](#))
- La antología anual de ficción breve editada por Jonathan Strahan cambia de casa: a partir de 2020 será publicada por el sello editorial Saga Press (perteneciente a Simon & Schuster) bajo el título de **Year's Best Science Fiction: The Saga Annual Anthology of SF**. Por lo tanto, **The Best Science Fiction & Fantasy of the Year: Vol. 13** será el último volumen de la serie antológica que Strahan publica con Rebellion Publishing/Solaris. El primer volumen de la nueva serie, **Year's Best Science Fiction 2019: The Saga Annual Anthology of SF** debutará previsiblemente en julio de 2020. ([Anuncio](#))

Novedades

A continuación, un listado de las que creo son las obras de ciencia ficción que más os pueden interesar de entre todas las que se van a publicar durante 2019. El listado lo iré actualizando con el tiempo, e iré incluyendo reseñas que vayan apareciendo. Asimismo, he tratado de evitar spoilers, por lo que, por ejemplo, no he incluido sinopsis en aquellos libros que son continuaciones de otros (y que puede que no hayáis leido).

Comencemos con el recorrido cronológico por las obras publicadas durante primer trimestre del año 2019:

- **Alliance Rising** • C.J. Cherryh y Jane S. Fancher (8 de enero, DAW Books) La veterana autora comienza una nueva serie ambientada en el universo de la Alianza-Unión, que es el mismo en el que transcurren algunas de sus obras más emblemáticas como **Downbelow Station** (1981) y **Cyteen** (1988).

- **Shadow Captain** • Alastair Reynolds (15 de enero, Orbit US/Gollancz) Continuación de **Revenger**, ganadora del Locus a la mejor novela juvenil en 2017 y descrita como “*La isla del tesoro en el espacio*”. Como su predecesora, se trata de ciencia ficción juvenil de aventuras.

- **Golden State** • Ben H. Winters (22 de enero, Mulholland Books) Una novela especulativa de futuro cercano que trata sobre una sociedad en la que todo lo que se hace o dice queda grabado, y en la que la verdad se valora por encima de todo lo demás.



Lazlo Ratesic is 54, a 19-year veteran of the Speculative Service, from a family of law enforcement and in a strange alternate society that values law and truth above all else.


Laz is a resident of The Golden State, a nation resembling California, where like-minded Americans retreated after the erosion of truth and the spread of lies made public life, and governance, increasingly impossible. There, surrounded by the high walls of compulsory truth-telling, knowingly contradicting the truth—the Objectively So—is the greatest possible crime. Stopping those crimes, punishing them, is Laz's job. In its service, he is one of the few individuals permitted to harbor untruths—to "speculate" on what might have happened in the commission of a crime.

But the Golden State is far less a paradise than its name might suggest. To monitor, verify, and enforce the Objectively So requires a veritable panopticon of surveillance, recording, and record-keeping. And when those in control of the truth twist it for nefarious means, the Speculators may be the only ones with the power to fight back.


- **Vigilance** • Robert Jackson Bennett (29 de enero, Tor.com Publishing) Este autor de fantasía se ha atrevido con esta novela corta de CF distópica en la que nos describe unos EE.UU. que han sucumbido a la paranoia, la desconfianza y la violencia de las armas de fuego. The United States. 2030. John McDean executive produces "Vigilance," a reality game show designed to make sure American citizens stay alert to foreign and domestic threats. Shooters are introduced into a "game environment," and the survivors get a cash prize. The TV audience is not the only one that's watching though, and McDean soon finds out what it's like to be on the other side of the camera.

- **Here and Now and Then** • Mike Chen (29 de enero, Mira Books) No da el perfil de obra de género (novela debut, editorial generalista), pero a) incluye viajes en el tiempo como un elemento crucial de la trama y b) viene avalada por buenas críticas (por ejemplo, la de *Publisher's Weekly*). El argumento es una historia arquetípica de padre ausente en la que —por una serie de circunstancias entre las que se incluye una agencia secreta de viajeros en el tiempo— el protagonista y su hija terminan separados por más de un siglo de distancia (temporal).




- **The City in The Middle of the Night** • Charlie Jane Anders (12 de febrero, Tor Books) La autora de **All The Birds in the Sky** sigue con esta novela la tradición de ciencia ficción antropológica de obras como **La mano izquierda de la oscuridad** de Ursula K. Le Guin o la trilogía de la Xenogenesis de Octavia Butler. La protagonista de la misma tendrá que luchar tanto contra un medio ambiente fundamentalmente hostil con la vida humana como con una sociedad —repartida entre dos ciudades en el terminador de este planeta con acoplamiento de marea— al borde del colapso. January is a dying planet—divided between a permanently frozen darkness on one side, and blazing endless sunshine on the other. Humanity clings to life, spread across two archaic cities built in the sliver of habitable dusk. And living inside the cities, one flush with anarchy and the other buckling under the stricture of the ruling body, is increasingly just as dangerous as the uninhabitable wastelands outside.

Sophie, a student and reluctant revolutionary, is supposed to be dead, after being exiled into the night. Saved only by forming an unusual bond with the enigmatic beasts who roam the ice, Sophie vows to stay hidden from the world, hoping she can heal.

But fate has other plans—and Sophie's ensuing odyssey and the ragtag family she finds will change the entire world.

- **The Test** • Sylvain Neuvel (12 de febrero, Tor.com Publishing) El autor de **Sleeping Giants** se atreve aquí con una distopía –en formato breve– de futuro cercano que tiene mucho que ver con el clima político actual. Hay [excerpt](#) disponible.

How do you value a life when all you have is multiple choice?



- **Doctor Who: Scratchman** • Tom Baker (12 de febrero, BBC Books) El mismísimo Tom Baker, que encarnó en la serie al cuarto Doctor, rescata en esta novelización el guión de un proyecto de película que él mismo iba a protagonizar en su momento, y que no llegó a realizarse.
- **Broken Stars** • Ken Liu (ed.) (19 de febrero, Tor Books) Tras el éxito de **Invisible Planets**, Liu se embarca en una nueva antología de ciencia ficción china en la que participan autores como Xia Jia, Han Song, Baoshu, Hao Jingfang, Chen Quifan y otros. Podemos leer ya la [introducción](#).

Award-winning author Ken Liu presents a new anthology of Chinese short speculative fiction. Some of the included authors are already familiar to readers in the West (Liu Cixin and Hao Jingfang, both Hugo winners); some are publishing in English for the first time. Because of the growing interest in newer SFF from China, virtually every story here was first published in Chinese in the 2010s. The stories span the range from short-shorts to novellas, and evoke every hue on the emotional spectrum. Besides stories firmly entrenched in subgenres familiar to Western SFF readers such as hard SF, cyberpunk, science fantasy, and space opera, the anthology also includes stories that showcase deeper ties to Chinese culture: alternate Chinese history, chuanyue time travel, satire with historical and contemporary allusions that are likely unknown to the average Western reader. While the anthology makes no claim or attempt to be “representative” or “comprehensive,” it demonstrates the vibrancy and diversity of science fiction being written in China at this moment.

In addition, three essays at the end of the book explore the history of Chinese science fiction publishing, the state of contemporary Chinese fandom, and how the growing interest in science fiction in China has impacted writers who had long labored in obscurity.


- **No Way** • S.J. Morden (26 de febrero, Orbit) La continuación de **One Way**, un thriller en la que un grupo de condenados a cadena perpetua eran enviados a Marte como mano de obra barata para construir un hábitat científico.

- **The Very Best of the Best: 35 Years of The Year's Best Science Fiction** •

Gardner Dozois (ed.) (26 de febrero, St. Martin's Press)

La última antología de este insigne editor fallecido en 2018. Este volumen sigue a los dos anteriores *Best of the Bests* —a su vez recopilaciones de lo mejor de sus antologías *Year's Best SF*—, cubriendo el periodo 2002-2017. Dozois recoge en él las que considera mejores 38 historias de la cosecha de la última década y media, sirviendo como una auténtica exposición de la ciencia ficción que se está escribiendo en el siglo XXI. Se incluyen relatos de autores tan conocidos como Charles Stross, Michael Swanwick, Nancy Kress, Greg Egan, Stephen Baxter, Pat Cadigan, Allen M. Steele, Elizabeth Bear, Peter Watts, y otros muchos. Un *must-have*.

- **Ancestral Night** • Elizabeth Bear (5 de marzo, Saga Press/Gollancz) El retorno de Elizabeth Bear a la ciencia ficción es uno de los libros más esperados de 2019. Esta es la primera entrega de una ambiciosa saga de space opera de "escala galáctica" que se ha dado en llamar *White Space*, y que promete —según su autora— "abordar profundas ideas filosóficas". Halmey Dz and her partner Connla Kurucz are salvage operators, living just on the inside of the law...usually. Theirs is the perilous and marginal existence—with barely enough chance of striking it fantastically big—just once—to keep them coming back for more. They pilot their tiny ship into the scars left by unsuccessful White Transitions, searching for the relics of lost human and alien vessels. But when they make a shocking discovery about an alien species that has been long thought dead, it may be the thing that could tip the perilous peace mankind has found into full-out war.



- **Infinite Detail** • Tim Maughan (5 de marzo, FSG Originals) Algun día alguien le pondrá nombre a este subgénero (¿internetpunk? :-P). Mientras tanto, simplemente la describiré como una novela al estilo Neal Stephenson o Cory Doctorow, que recoge las últimas tendencias del mundo digital (fake news, erosión de la privacidad, ciberterrorismo, ...) y las extrapolá en una especie de distopía de futuro muy cercano. La novela creo que es autopublicada, así que es posible que no reciba mucha atención (yo mismo me la he encontrado casi de casualidad). No obstante, en Tor.com han publicado un [excerpt](#).

BEFORE: In Bristol's center lies the Croft, a digital no-man's-land cut off from the surveillance, Big Data dependence, and corporate-sponsored, globally hegemonic aspirations that have overrun the rest of the world. Ten years in, it's become a center of creative counterculture. But it's fraying at the edges, radicalizing from inside. How will it fare when its chief architect, Rushdi Mannan, takes off to meet his boyfriend in New York City—now the apotheosis of the new techno-utopian global metropolis?

AFTER: An act of anonymous cyberterrorism has permanently switched off the Internet. Global trade, travel, and communication have collapsed. The luxuries that characterized modern life are scarce. In the Croft, Mary—who has visions of people presumed dead—is sought out by grieving families seeking connections to lost ones. But does Mary have a gift or is she just hustling to stay alive? Like Grids, who runs the Croft's black market like personal turf. Or like Tyrone, who hoards music (culled from cassettes, the only medium to survive the crash) and tattered sneakers like treasure.





- **Creation Machine** • Andrew Bannister (5 de marzo, Tor Books) Esta novela debut es la primera de una trilogía que tiene como particularidad que el escenario es una galaxia artificial (!). Desde luego el planteamiento es original, ya veremos si la ejecución está a la altura.

In the vast, artificial galaxy called the Spin, a rebellion has been crushed. Viklun Hass is eliminating all remnants of the opposition. Starting with his daughter. But Fleare Hass has had time to plan her next move from exile to the very frontiers of a new war.

For hundreds of millions of years, the planets and stars of the Spin have been the only testament to the god-like engineers that created them. Now, beneath the surface of a ruined planet, one of their machines has been found.

- **Famous Men Who Never Lived** • K. Chess (5 de marzo, Tin House Books) Otro ejemplo de que las fronteras entre género y *mainstream* se están derrumbando. Esta es una novela que habla sobre refugiados de guerra... provenientes de una línea temporal alternativa en la que New York ha sido destruida por un guerra nuclear.

Wherever Hel looks, New York City is both reassuringly familiar and terribly wrong. As one of the thousands who fled the outbreak of nuclear war in an alternate United States—an alternate timeline—she finds herself living as a refugee in our own not-so-parallel New York. The slang and technology are foreign to her, the politics and art unrecognizable. While others, like her partner Vikram, attempt to assimilate, Hel refuses to reclaim her former career or create a new life. Instead, she obsessively rereads Vikram's copy of *The Pyronauts*—a science fiction masterwork in her world that now only exists as a single flimsy paperback—and becomes determined to create a museum dedicated to preserving the remaining artifacts and memories of her vanished culture.

- **Alice Payne Rides** • Kate Heartfield (5 de marzo, Tor.com Publishing) Otra serie de novelas cortas de las que está publicando el sello de ficción breve de Tor. Esta continua la historia comenzada en **Alice Payne Arrives**, con una ladrona/viajera en el tiempo como protagonista principal.

- **Today I Am Carey** • Martin L. Shoemaker (5 de marzo, Baen) El argumento me trae resonancias a la novela corta de Isaac Asimov **El hombre del bicentenario**, pero quién sabe, igual va por otra línea.

Mildred has Alzheimer's. As memories fade, she acquires the aid of a full-time android to assist her in everyday life. Carey. Carey takes care of Mildred, but its true mission is to fill in the gaps in Mildred's past. To bring yesterday into today by becoming a copy. But not merely a copy of a physical person. A copy from the inside out.

After Mildred passes, Carey must find a new purpose. For a time, that purpose is Mildred's family. To keep them safe from harm. To be of service. There is Paul Owens, the overworked scientist and business leader. Susan Owens, the dedicated teacher. And Millie, a curious little girl who will grow up alongside her android best friend. And Carey will grow up with her. Carey cannot age. But Carey can change.

Lafferty (7 de marzo, Orion/Gollancz) El editor Jonathan Strahan ha sido el encargado de confeccionar este volumen definitivo de la obra de Lafferty para la prestigiosa colección SF Masterworks de la editorial británica Gollancz. El volumen está prologado por Neil Gaiman, e incluye introducciones a cada una de los 22 relatos seleccionados por parte de escritores de la talla de Samuel R. Delany, Harlan Ellison, Nancy Kress, Robert Silverberg, Jeff VanderMeer o Connie Willis (por citar algunos).

- **The Rosewater Insurrection** • Tade Thompson (12 de marzo, Orbit) La continuación de **Rosewater**, en lo que será el segundo volumen de la trilogía denominada *Wormwood*. Está ambientada también en la ciudad-suburbio-de-domo-alienígena nigeriana que da nombre al primer libro. 

- **Zero Bomb** • M.T. Hill (19 de marzo, Titan Books) El tema central de esta novela parece ser “automatización versus necesidad de trabajar”.

The near future. Following the death of his daughter Martha, Remi flees the north of England for London. Here he tries to rebuild his life as a cycle courier, delivering subversive documents under the nose of an all-seeing state. But when a driverless car attempts to run him over, Remi soon discovers that his old life will not let him move on so easily. Someone is leaving coded messages for Remi across the city, and they seem to suggest that Martha is not dead at all. Unsure what to believe, and increasingly unable to trust his memory, Remi is slowly drawn into the web of a dangerous radical whose '70s sci-fi novel is now a manifesto for direct action against automation, technology, and England itself. 

- **The Light Brigade** • Kameron Hurley (19 de marzo, Saga Press/Angry Robot) Anunciada como una space opera bélica en la tradición de **Tropas del espacio** o **La guerra interminable**, pero a la que Hurley le da una vuelta de tuerca (que no voy a revelar para no estropearos la sorpresa).

The Light Brigade: it's what soldiers fighting the war against Mars call the ones who come back...different. Grunts in the corporate corps get busted down into light to travel to and from interplanetary battlefronts. Everyone is changed by what the corps must do in order to break them down into light. Those who survive learn to stick to the mission brief—no matter what actually happens during combat.

Dietz, a fresh recruit in the infantry, begins to experience combat drops that don't sync up with the platoon's. And Dietz's bad drops tell a story of the war that's not at all what the corporate brass want the soldiers to think is going on.

Is Dietz really experiencing the war differently, or is it combat madness? Trying to untangle memory from mission brief and survive with sanity intact, Dietz is ready to become a hero—or maybe a villain; in war it's hard to tell the difference.



- **Radicalized** • Cory Doctorow (19 de marzo, Tor Books/Head of Zeus) Colección de cuatro novelas cortas de ciencia ficción de futuro muy cercano que conectan con visiones sociales, económicas y tecnológicas del presente, muy en línea con el pensamiento sociopolítico que este autor ya ha mostrado en obras anteriores. In Cory Doctorow's new novellas, corporations provide welfare, but only if you use their DRM'd devices: toasters that won't toast third-party bread, dishwashers that won't wash third-party dishes.

Unauthorized Bread is a tale of immigration, the toxicity of economic and technological stratification, and the young and downtrodden fighting against all odds to survive and prosper. In **Model Minority**, a Superman-like figure attempts to rectify the corruption of the police forces he long erroneously thought protected the defenseless... only to find his efforts adversely affecting their victims. **Radicalized** is a story of a dark web-powered violent uprising against insurance companies told from the perspective of a man desperate to secure funding for an experimental drug that could cure his wife's terminal cancer. The fourth story, **Masque of the Red Death**, harkens back to Doctorow's **Walkaway**, taking on issues of survivalism versus community.






- **Sooner or Later Everything Falls Into the Sea** • Sarah Pinsker (19 de marzo, Small Beer Press) Pinsker ha demostrado ser una de las autoras de ficción breve más interesantes de la actualidad (sin ir más lejos, el año pasado fue doble finalista en los Hugo), por lo que su colección de relatos es de las más anticipadas del año.

The baker's dozen stories gathered here (including a new, previously unpublished story) turn readers into travelers to the past, the future, and explorers of the weirder points of the present. The journey is the thing as Pinsker weaves music, memory, technology, history, mystery, love, loss, and even multiple selves on generation ships and cruise ships, on highways and high seas, in murder houses and treehouses. They feature runaways, fiddle-playing astronauts, and retired time travelers; they are weird, wired, hopeful, haunting, and deeply human. They are often described as beautiful but Pinsker also knows that the heart wants what the heart wants and that is not always right, or easy.



- **Finder** • Suzanne Palmer (2 de abril, DAW Books) La flamante ganadora del Hugo 2018 al mejor relato (*novelette*) con la deliciosa “The Secret Life of Bots” debuta en su primera novela con una obra llena acción y humor, y con un pícaro protagonista que hará las delicias de más de uno.

Fergus Ferguson has been called a lot of names: thief, con artist, repo man. He prefers the term finder.

His latest job should be simple. Find the spacecraft Venetia's Sword and steal it back from Arum Gilger, ex-nobleman turned power-hungry trade boss. He'll slip in, decode the ship's compromised AI security, and get out of town, Sword in hand.

Fergus locates both Gilger and the ship in the farthest corner of human-inhabited space, a gas-giant-harvesting colony called Cernee. But Fergus' arrival at the colony is anything but simple. A cable car explosion launches Cernee into civil war, and Fergus must ally with Gilger's enemies to navigate a field of space mines and a small army of hostile mercenaries. What was supposed to be a routine job evolves into negotiating a power struggle between factions. Even worse, Fergus has become increasingly—and inconveniently—invested in the lives of the locals.

It doesn't help that a dangerous alien species thought mythical prove unsettlingly real, and their ominous triangle ships keep following Fergus around.

Foolhardy. Eccentric. Reckless. Whatever he's called, Fergus will need all the help he can get to take back the Sword and maybe save Cernee from destruction in the process.

Los fans de Ted Chiang llevábamos aguardando mucho tiempo —**Stories of Your Life and Others** es de 2002— a que el autor recopilara los relatos con los que, con cuentagotas, nos ha ido deleitando durante estos años. This much-anticipated second collection of stories is signature Ted Chiang, full of revelatory ideas and deeply sympathetic characters. In the epistolary "Exhalation," an alien scientist makes a shocking discovery with ramifications not just for his own people, but for all of reality. - **Velocity Weapon** • Megan E. O’Keefe (11 de junio, Orbit) Primer volumen de una trilogía de space operas con elementos de intriga denominada *The Protectorate*. La portada ha llamado bastante la atención, habrá que ver si el contenido está a la misma altura (para empezar, podéis probar el [excerpt](#)).

Sanda Greeve remembers the rebels attacking her, and she remembers seeking the safety of an evacuation pod. But when she’s awakened, it’s not by friendly hands or enemy—the hands are not human at all. She has been rescued by a sentient ship, The Light of Berossus, and “Bero” has some bad news: she’s missing most of one of her legs...and she’s been unconscious for 230 years. Oh, and the war ended a long time ago and she might be the only human left.

Sanda tries to cope with this. She even forges a friendship with the ship, and tries to imagine a future for herself. The book alternates between scenes of Sanda’s present and the years of war, told through the flashbacks of her brother, Biran, who has his own tragedies to cope with. But even this is disrupted when Bero finds another human survivor. The discovery that could end Sanda’s loneliness is complicated when the survivor, Tomas, reveals that he was part of the centuries-old rebellion, and that he might not be willing to leave his hatred of Sanda’s army in the past.






